I love eating chocolate! I have a lot of chocolate in my house. I'm very happy. Thank you, Mexico!

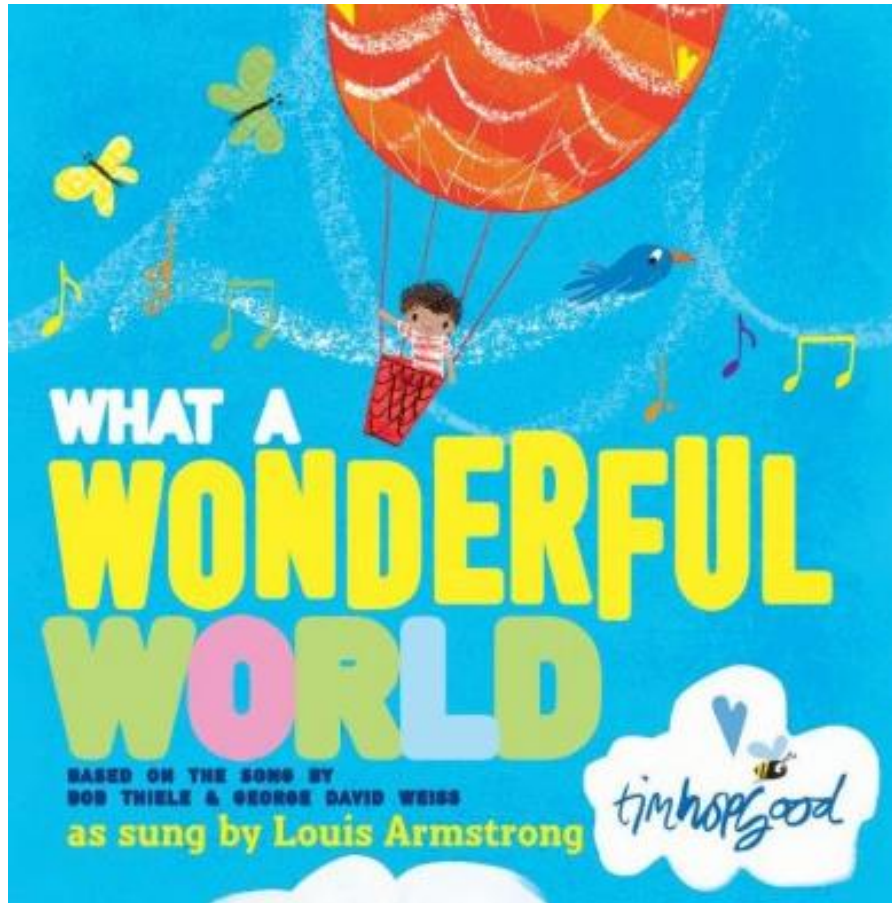
